Here are just a few of the statistics from some of the different Released-Time Education ("RTE") ministries (aka School Ministries & Christian Learning Centers) in the United States that are making a huge impact in the lives of public school students...

General Information about Released-Time Programs

- Released-Time Education is 101 years old, started in 1914 in Gary, Indiana by public school superintendent Dr. William Wirt.
- It is estimated that RTE is now functioning in at least 32 states (some report all 50 states), serving an estimated 350,000 students.
- RTE has been researched and conclusively linked to improvements in student behavior and academic performance.

Chino Valley Released Time Christian Education (California)

- 70% of Chino Valley, California is un-churched.
- Over 5,000 students have participated in Chino Valley RTE.
- 80% of the students participated in Chino RTE have come to Christ.
- There are 350 students in the 4th, 5th and 6th grades in Chino Valley RTE in 2015-2016.

Core Foundations (Georgia)

- 250 students in ten schools.
- Over 3,000 students have participated in Core Foundations courses.
- Approximately 500 students have come to Christ.
- Over 25 students have been called into full-time ministry through this RTE program.
- Over 10,000 hours of Bible education have been taught.

- Over 900 Students enrolled this year in the 2015- 2016 program in three High Schools, three Middle Schools, and one Elementary School.
- 71 students came to Christ in 2014.

Christian Learning Center Greenville (South Carolina)

- 1,800 students enrolled in the program this year.
- RTE is serving in 18 area schools.
- Over 1,800 students have come to Christ since this RTE program started.
- Over 13,000 students have participated in the program.
- 43 churches are involved in volunteer program.
- 274 volunteers serve the students.
